Our School

Austin Classical School is a **Christian, classical, and collaborative school** in Austin, Texas that currently serves 342 students in Pre-Kindergarten through 12th grade. We began in 2013 with 13 students in Kindergarten-2nd grade. Adding one new grade each year, we will have our **first graduating class in May 2025**. The School of Rhetoric meets on campus Monday through Thursday and incorporates a full-day of at-home learning each Friday.

Our collaborative model allows maturing students to gain **increasing levels of independence**, **self-discipline**, **and time management skills** as they add more class days at school and more independent study at home, preparing them well for success in college and life.

Our Mission

Austin Classical School exists to glorify Jesus Christ by co-laboring with families to cultivate wise, virtuous, and humble students through an excellent classical Christian education.

Class of 2025 Curricular & Pedagogical Distinctives

- Our educational philosophy emphasizes **depth over breadth**, although our curriculum covers a much wider breadth of history than most schools. Our students learn to ruminate on texts and subjects to gain a deeper understanding and achieve mastery of necessary skills.
- An emphasis on learning how to **communicate effectively and beautifully** is combined with a **focus on servant leadership** as unifying principles in the liberal arts and sciences curriculum. Our aim is to form students who can think deeply, make wise decisions, act courageously, and persevere through difficulty.
- Humanities courses include extensive primary source reading, Socratic discussion, critical analysis, oral and written exams, frequent essays, poetry recitations, and class presentations. Students also completed Latin through Level IV, gaining the ability to translate Latin and think within the framework of another language.
- All students take math through Calculus and the three foundational science courses: Biology, Physics, and Chemistry, with each focusing on careful scientific argumentation in lab reports, a solid foundation in key concepts, frequent presentation and writing opportunities, and historical context for scientific and mathematical ideas. Students are offered a fourth year of advance science as an elective.
- The rhetoric course of study culminates in a year-long senior thesis, which
 includes a written research paper and an oral presentation and defense before a
 panel of judges. This defense is the capstone of students' experience at ACS.

Co-Curricular Distinctives

- Required participation in the House System. Our House System intentionally fosters community, collegial competition, and the cultivation of servant leadership with four houses across grades 7-12. House life encompasses all aspects of student culture with student-led meetings, retreats, service days, academic and athletic competitions, and social events. Students may accrue up to 15 service hours per year to earn points for their houses.
- Our House Leadership Program allows students to focus on administrative and strategic planning skills, creating healthy culture and teams, and mentoring and nurturing relationships across grades. Leadership roles include House Prefect and chairs of communications, service, and traditions.
- All students take a **course in leadership** during their junior year and gain servant leadership experience through our Kindergarten Reading Buddies program, house leadership, and middle school math tutors. Students may also chose a for-credit Student-Leadership Practicum as an elective.
- All class members have frequently and selflessly volunteered and served as student ambassadors throughout our school community. Their service and commitment have been vitally important to the growth and health of our
